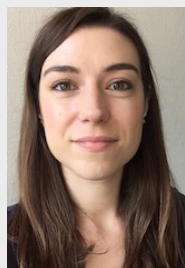
Dr Philip Lindholm completed his PhD dissertation, entitled 'Synaesthesia in British Romantic Poetry', in June 2018 at the University of Lausanne, Switzerland, where he is currently employed as a temporary lecturer (MER2). His work is located at a mid-way between Romantic science and literature and focuses on the senses and the embodied imagination

Christoph Neuenschwander joins as a visiting lecturer (MER2) in linguistics. He is a doctoral student at the University of Bern. His work examines language ideological debates about pidgins and creoles, specifically Hawai'i Creole and Tok Pisin. His PhD focuses on the meta-linguistic discourses that have facilitated (or slowed down) the legitimisation and standardisation processes of these two languages



Amy Player joins the department as a Graduate Assistant in Modern English Literature. Amy's research interests include ecocriticism, intermediality, ecoliterature and literature of the Anthropocene, and more specifically contemporary British nature writing and its intersections with genres and movements such as Transcendentalism, Romanticism, Pastoral and Georgic

Dr Roy Sellars joins the department for this semester, standing in for Prof. Rachel Falconer. He is based at the University of St. Gallen, and he teaches and researches literature from the early modern to the modern periods; in his spare time he is also a translator and copy-editor. He holds a consultation hour at 15h15 on Fridays and looks forward to meeting you



Dr Rachael Stanley has recently joined the department as Première Assistante in Modern English Literature. She has previously worked in the UK at the University of East Anglia, and the University of Nottingham. She specializes in British fiction of the twentieth- and twenty-first centuries, with a particular interest in literary modernism (1900-1945)

Dr Antoinina Bevan Zlata joins us as a Chargée de Cours teaching an Explication de textes on *Othello*. She has taught courses on early modern poetry and prose in Zurich and Geneva, and her research interests include early modern polemic and genre theory, and the visual culture of Reformation England with a particular focus on the late poetry of John Milton. 
Forthcoming Events
