

Kevin Curran has been awarded a four-year FNS grant for his project "Theater and Judgment in Early Modern England". Two new PhD students will be hired as part of this project. Together, the team will produce a monograph, **Theater and Judgment in the** Age of Shakespeare; two doctoral theses, "Theater and Judgment in Tudor England" and "Printed Drama and the Culture of Judgment in Early Modern England"; and an edited collection entitled Cultures of Judgment in the Early Modern World. Prof. Greg Walker at the University of Edinburgh and Prof. Emma Smith at Oxford University will be joining the project as international collaborators. In addition, Kevin's essay "Masques dans le théâtre de Shakespeare" (translated by Vincent **Laughery**) appears in the exhibition catalogue for Masques & Théâtre, which runs at the Fondation Martin Bodmer in Geneva from October 16 to April 11. The exhibition includes a range of performance documents from the Bodmer's archives alongside a first-of-its-kind display of the modern theater masks created by the Swiss artist and designer Werner Strub. As global warming and the current ecological crisis bring modern humans face to face with their finite planetary resources and their impacts on the biosphere, narratives of apocalypse and collapse proliferate in contemporary culture.
