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The department welcomes a number of new members of staff this semester!

Elvis Coimbra Gomes has joined the English Department and currently teaches two IELL workshops and the seminar "Introduction to Discourse Analysis" for 2nd year BA students. Elvis defended his PhD thesis at Queen Mary University of London last August. His research focuses on how people who suffer from obsessive-compulsive disorder use language to construct gender and sexual identities. He is interested in the fields of language, gender, and sexuality, health communication, corpus linguistics and critical discourse analysis.





Chen Cui has received a 48-month research grant from the Chinese Scholarship Council to pursue doctoral work under the supervision of **Denis Renevey**. He comes to Lausanne with a Bachelor's degree in English and Education from Capital Normal University (Beijing), a Master's degree in theoretical linguistics from Beijing Language and Culture University, and a European Double MA Degree between l'Università Ca'Foscari Venezia (Italy) and Otto-Friedrich-Universität Bamberg (Germany). His current project focusses on nature writing in global medieval travel texts.

His research will focus on theories and practices of judgment in Tudor drama (1485-1604); he is also interested in Literary Theory and its history. Patrick received his BA and MA in Comparative Literature from Free University in Berlin, and was a visiting student at the University of Bergen, the University of Vienna, and Harvard University.



Research and Publications

Rory Critten gave a paper at a one-day online colloquium on "Women in the History of Language Learning and Teaching" on 17 September. The colloquium was co-organized by researchers at the universities of Bremen and Leeds for the HOLLT (History of Language Learning and Teaching) network. Rory's paper was entitled "French Lessons in Late-Medieval England: The Role of Women".

Kevin Curran's four-year FNS-funded project, "Theater and Judgment in Early Modern England", launched on 1 September. 
