Helen Benedict Anna Froula

Helen Benedict is a recipient of the 2021 PEN Jean Stein Grant for Literary Oral History and the Ida B. Wells Award for Bravery in Journalism. She is the author of the new book, Map of Hope and Sorrow: Stories of Refugees Trapped in Greece (co-authored with Eyad Awwadawnan), and of 13 previous books, including the award-winning The Lonely Soldier: The Private War of Women at War Serving in Iraq, and the novel, Wolf Season. Her writing inspired both a class action suit against the Pentagon on behalf of people sexually assaulted in the military and the 2012 Oscar-nominated documentary, The Invisible War. She is a Professor of Journalism at Columbia University, New York. For more information, visit www.helenbenedict.com.

Anna Froula is Associate Professor of Film Studies at East Carolina University, where she founded and continues to run the Veteran to Scholar Boot Camp for student veterans with support from the National Endowment for the Humanities. She has published widely on zombies, cyborgs, and representations of gender and war culture. Froula lives in Greenville, NC, with her husband, dog, and two cats.
