## Research and Publications

**Philip Lindholm**'s [essay](#) "Mountains, glowing hot': The Radical Volcanic Aesthetics of Wordsworth's Early Poetry" has just been published in the Edinburgh University Press journal *Romanticism*.

**Martine Hennard Dutheil**'s co-edited book with **Alberto Roncaccia**, [Traduire, illustrer, réécrire, mettre en scène: regards croisés/Translate, illustrate, rewrite, stage: crossing viewpoints](#) (Franco Cesati Editore, Firenze, 2023), is hot off the press. It notably contains essays on the translation history of Oscar Wilde's play *Salomé* by **Juliette Loesch** and on Roald Dahl's *Revoltin' Rhymes* in French by **Florence Casulli**. **Martine** herself wrote an essay on J.J. Rousseau & Henri Rousseau in the section devoted to translation, transposition and transcreation. **Kirill Melnikov** and **Marie Emilie Walz** also contributed to the volume, with a co-written book chapter "In judging him, [we] judge ourselves': Murder, Morality, and Femininity in Fyodor Dostoevsky's *Crime and Punishment* and Angela Carter's 'Elegy for a Freelance'". **Marie** also wrote a book chapter entitled "'This entire dream, in fact, was custom-made and hand-built': Angela Carter's Transcreative Experiments with Max Reinhardt and William Dieterle's *A Midsummer Night's Dream*".

**Christiania Whitehead** published "Reading the Saint's Church: A Northern Perspective", in [Architectural Representation in Medieval Textual and Material Culture](#), ed. Hannah Bailey, Karl Kinsella and Daniel Thomas (Arc Humanities, 2023), pp. 171-88.

On 15 March, **Agnieszka Soltysik Monnet** gave a joint talk with **Christian Arnsperger** (FGSE) on “Envisioning the Ecological Future” at the University of Lodz, and they also participated in a roundtable discussion as part of the launch of the journal volume that they co-edited, [Text Matters: A Journal of Theory, Literature and Culture](#), a special volume dedicated to the theme of “The Ecological Future”.

On 16 March, **Sangam MacDuff** gave a talk on “The Right Use of Reason’: Virginia Woolf, Isaac Watts, and Logic” as part of the English Department Lecture Series.

On 21 March, **Rachel Falconer** gave a talk entitled “Tolkien's Environmental Vision”, for **SCOPE's** 2023 Spring Talk. She'd like to extend a big thank you to **SCOPE**, and all those who contributed excellent ideas in the Q & A.

**Pascale Petit** gave a public poetry reading for CIEL on 29 March, in a week devoted to the theme “Ecrire les eaux”. She also generously led a seminar in **Rachel Falconer's** MA class on EcoPoetry.

On 29 March, **Christiania Whitehead**, **Olena Danylovysh**, and **Denis Renevey** offered papers and a workshop as part of their FNS team presentation on “Reconfiguring the Apophatic Tradition in Late Medieval England”, at the CUSO doctoral workshop in Medieval and Early Modern English Studies (University of Geneva). **Christiania's** paper was entitled “Apophysis in an Age of Image Defence”. **Olena** gave a paper on “Putting Away Pressing Thoughts in *The Cloud of Unknowing*”. These papers were accompanied by a workshop led by **Denis** on the *oeuvre* of the late fifteenth-century Yorkshire Carthusian, Richard Methley.

On 30 March, **Céline Magada** participated in the seminar “Marlowe and Jonson” led by Professor **Judith Haber** (Tufts University, USA) at the Shakespeare Association of America 51<sup>st</sup> Annual Meeting in Minneapolis that took place from 29 March to 1 April 2023. Her paper was entitled “‘Art hath an enemy called *Ignorance*’: the Process of Judgment in Ben Jonson’s *Every Man Out of His Humour*”.

A CUSO event, “Queer Theory and Literary Study”, co-organized by **Agnieszka Soltysik Monnet** and **Matthew Scully** with the support of **Elodie Rogliardo**, took place on Friday, 31 March. It featured two keynote speakers, **Prof. Xine Yao** (University College London) and **Prof. Kevin Ohi** (Boston College), as well as a doctoral presentation by **Dr. Patrick Jones** (UNIGE). The event was well attended by students and staff from Lausanne, Geneva, Bern, and Fribourg, and it led to a great day of discussions.
